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Profile 2018-2019

The School

Established by Gideon Frost in 1876 for “the children of Friends and those similarly sentimented,” Friends Academy is today a co-educational college preparatory day school on the North Shore of Long Island. There are 378 students in the Upper School (grades 9 through 12), 158 in the Middle School (grades 6 through 8), and 215 children in the Lower School (Early Childhood through grade 5) from Nassau, Queens, and Suffolk counties.

The school is located on a 65-acre campus in the Glen Cove-Locust Valley area. Nearly all buildings have been renovated and new facilities built, including an expanded Upper School and Middle School, a center for the arts, a three-story, free standing library, modern science laboratories, four computer education centers, a 400-seat theater, art studios, a gymnasium, field house, and extensive athletic fields.

The faculty is the school’s finest resource. It numbers 122 full-time and part-time teachers; 103 hold masters degrees and 6 hold doctorates. To ensure a student body that reflects the larger community in which Friends is located, 19 percent of all families receive some form of financial aid; 35 percent of our students are students of color.

Friends Academy is a member of the National Association of College Admissions Counselors and is accredited by the New York State Association of Independent Schools (NYSAIS).

Philosophy

The philosophy of Friends Academy arises from the Quaker belief in the unique worth and individuality of every person. The school program is guided by the traditional Quaker testimonies of:

Simplicity

Moderation

Patience

Caring service to others

Integrity in thought and action

Commitment to non-violent resolution of differences

These qualities underlie life at the school and the spontaneous sharing of thoughts at weekly Meeting for Worship. The silence and simple ministry of a “gathered Meeting” brings the sense that there is that of God in everyone.

Friends Academy seeks to create a vibrant, diverse community in which students work with caring teachers. The humanity of each teacher is vital if young people are to learn well, for human understanding creates a community of trust and acceptance. Friends also makes every effort to select students who share the school’s ideals as their own, who give their best efforts to the whole program of the school, and who will grow in the intelligent acceptance of their responsibility to serve others.

Upper School Program

Friends Academy limits the number of AP courses a student may take. In the senior year four APs are the maximum number in which a student may enroll. Occasionally, a student may take a fifth AP course in art after having completed a sequence of prerequisite courses. Gained entry into most AP classes is dependent upon prerequisite courses and grade minimums set by each department. These courses are introduced into the curriculum in the junior and senior years.

We believe that each student at Friends Academy should be exposed to a variety of academic experiences. For this reason the minimum requirements for a diploma include sixteen full-credit academic courses plus course work in religion, health, physical education, community service, the fine and performing arts, and outdoor education.

- **English (four years):** English 9; English 10; full year of American Literature in grade 11; two semesters of English electives in grade 12 or AP English Literature.
- **History and Social Studies (three years):** Ancient Foundations of Human Civilization/World History in grade 9; Patterns of Global Interaction 10; American History or \AP American History in grade 11; Electives are offered to seniors. Four years recommended.
- **Mathematics (three years):** Algebra I, Geometry, Algebra II or Algebra II/Trigonometry are required. For seniors not taking another math course, Topics in Precalculus is recommended. Four years are recommended.
- **Science (three years):** Three years of sciences are required; It is expected that students complete Biology, Chemistry, and Physics. Four years of science are recommended.
- **Languages and Cultures (three years):** The completion of level three of one world language is required; four recommended.
- **Arts:** One full credit of courses in the arts is required. Two or more years are recommended.
- **Quaker Life Department:** Quakerism in grade 9, Community Service in grade 10, and Senior Reflections in grade 12 are required courses. YSOP, Work Program, Weekly Quaker Meeting, and Community Service are commitments required of students.
- **Technology:** All students are required to take either one Computer Science course or one Digital Arts course.
- **Physical Education (four years):** All students are required to take the Physical Education classes unless they are playing on an interscholastic team. All dance classes count toward Physical Education credit.
- **Health (two semesters):** Health courses in grades 9 and 11 are required.
- **Outdoor Education:** All ninth grade students are required to attend the 3-day outdoor education program.
- **Independent Service Project:** This service project is a graduation requirement of all seniors.
- **Cum Laude Society (grades 11 and 12):** Selection is based on academic excellence alone. Must be a student for three consecutive semesters prior to selection for induction.

Testing in the Upper School includes the ISEE and SSAT for admission, final examinations each year in English, mathematics, science, world languages, and history, the PSAT, SAT, ACT, and Advanced Placement examinations.

Our off-campus Community Service program involves students from Lower School through senior year of Upper School, and progressively develops social awareness and sense of responsibility to the community.
